Table 1. Explanation of the Diagram of the Universe, from the Outer Circle to the Center:



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The Empyreal Heaven, the Habitations of God and of all the Elect. (Stable, incorruptible, above the realm of time.)

The Tenth Heaven, the First Mover. (An envelope containing the universe: <u>clockwise</u> rotation period of 24 hours; the motion is imparted to the 7 planetary spheres.)

The Ninth Heaven, or Crystalline Sphere.

The Eighth Heaven, the Firmament or Sphere of the Fixed Stars.

The Sphere of Saturn. (Counter-clockwise rotation period of approximately 12 years.)

The Sphere of Jupiter. (" " 12 years.)

The Sphere of Mars. (" " 2 years.)

The Sphere of the Sun. (""1 year.)

The Sphere of Venus. (" " 224 days.)

The Sphere of Mercury. (" " 88 days.)

The Sphere of the Moon. (" " 27.5 days.)

The Belt of Fire.

The Belt of Air.

Earth. (A stationary globe at the center of the universe, smaller than any planet save the moon. Everything on earth is a corruptible compound of the four elements—namely, fire, air, water, earth.)
